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FOREWORD

Involving children in decision-making processes has gained growing support over the last 20 years. Working alongside children, treating them as equal stakeholders, and valuing their knowledge is considered a best practice approach to consulting.

In November 2013, The City of Ballarat became a signatory to the Victorian Charter for Child Friendly Cities and Communities ('the Charter'). Consulting with children is one way in which the City of Ballarat can implement the principles of the Charter and ensure that the voices of children are heard and have the capacity to influence decision making within the municipality.

The 2015 Children's Consultation was developed in collaboration with an Internal Stakeholder Working Group and implemented with assistance from a number of primary schools and early childhood centres across the municipality. The results from the consultation will help inform Council and the community to further progress Ballarat as a child friendly city.

As the Chair of the Child Friendly Ballarat Advisory Committee, I would like to thank the children, schools, and childcare centres for their valuable contribution to this Children's Consultation. Council looks forward to continuing this consultative process with children to ensure we meet the needs of all children in the Ballarat community.

BACKGROUND

In 2012, the CoB Family and Children's Services (F&CS) unit completed an extensive project of consulting with children. More than 1,000 responses were received from children aged 1 to 12 years.

This consultation informed the Municipal Early Years Plan 2015-2018. It has also informed other Council plans and strategies, ensuring these important blueprints are child and family friendly and consider the views and needs of children.

CHILDREN'S CONSULTATION 2015

In 2015, following endorsement from the Child Friendly Ballarat Advisory Committee, F&CS again consulted with children to inform Council, CoB and the community and to further progress Ballarat as a child friendly city. The consultation process was led by the F&CS team, with guidance from an internal stakeholder group who provided input into the design and implementation of the consultation process.

Children's Consultation 2015

The Children's Consultation Report has been developed at the request of the Child Friendly Ballarat Advisory Committee, chaired by Councillor Belinda Coates.

The consultation questions were developed by the City of Ballarat F&CS team, in collaboration with the internal stakeholder group and key external stakeholders including Katherine Cape, Child and Youth Area Partnership, Department of Health and Human Services; and Wendy Baker, Department of Education and Training. The questions were also developed with guidance from Dr Jonathon Sargeant, an external expert in children's consultations. There was a focus on "neighbourhood" and "liveability" in the selection of key questions.

The consultation process included collecting ideas and views from students at 15 primary schools and 4 early years' services in the City of Ballarat. Primary school children were aged 5 to 13 years and children in early years services were aged 3 to 5 years. Ideas and views from younger children in the early years' facilities were collected via discussion with a facilitator. In total, 1,520 responses were collected between 15 July and 17 December, 2015.

A key focus of the consultation process was to identify concepts of "neighbourhood" and "liveability" from the perspective of children. As examples, when asked about safe places in their neighbourhood, 74% indicated "home" and 37% indicated "school." When asked about getting around their neighbourhood, 80% indicated they travel by car and 58% indicated that they walk.

Key findings of the Children's Consultation

In the consultation, surveyed children provided a voice to support future planning for our community, expressing the following issues and ideas:

- Concerns raised in relation to traffic management to make their neighbourhood safer.
- Utilisation of parks and safe playspaces and the importance of greenspace within close proximity to neighbourhoods.
- Importance of having safe access to school by walking or riding a bike.
- Local children are active and involved in outdoor activities.
- Good street lighting and management of green environment (tree management as well as increasing the number of trees in specific areas).
- Preschoolers identified playgrounds and play equipment as an important addition to their neighbourhood.

The Next Steps

- The Children's Consultation Report will be presented to City of Ballarat officers to inform future planning, followed by the development and implementation of a range of actions in collaboration with stakeholders and the community.
- The Children's Consultation Report will be shared with the Ballarat community to support the ongoing commitment as a Child Friendly City in line with the Victorian Child Friendly City Charter.
- Participating local schools will receive an individual report detailing their students' responses.

NOTES ON CONSULTATION DATA

The data included in the Children's Consultation Report represents the City of Ballarat as both an urban and rural municipality. For example, there are references to "electric fences" and "guns," primarily from children who live in villages on the outskirts of the city, e.g. Trawalla or Learmonth, and who attend school in Ballarat. These comments are included as they represent views of children who live in more rural areas.

Heat maps have been developed in response to specific questions raised by members of the Steering Group. Some of these questions aim to identify use of specific facilities, for example libraries or sporting clubs, by children in particular age groups or locations.

Note: Percentages may not add up to 100 percent (100%), due to rounding to a whole number.

This report presents a summary of the data from the Children's Consultation 2015 process and includes only a snapshot of the data available, including selected key topics of interest.

METHODOLOGY

The questions asked of children:

Primary School

1. Suburb you live in
2. Age
3. How do you get around your neighbourhood?
Options: I ride a bike, I walk, I ride a scooter, I ride in a car
4. What places do you visit or use in your neighbourhood?
Options: Playground, Skate park, My school, Friend's house, Park, Other schools, Bike track, BMX track, Pools/waterpark, Sporting clubs, Lakes/waterways, Libraries
5. Tell us 3 places in your neighbourhood where you feel safest? This can include home, school or any places that you visit.
6. What is one thing you would tell an adult to do to make your neighbourhood safer?

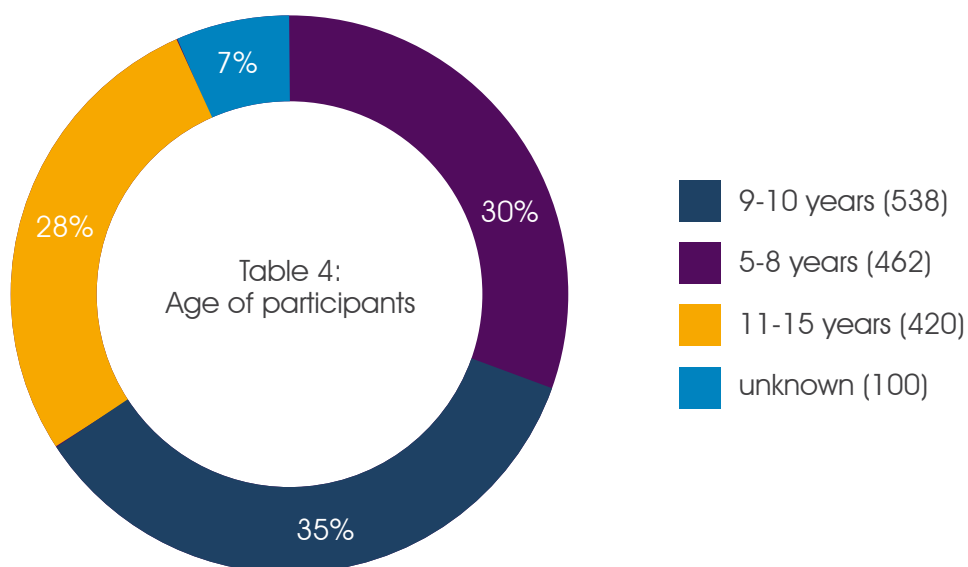

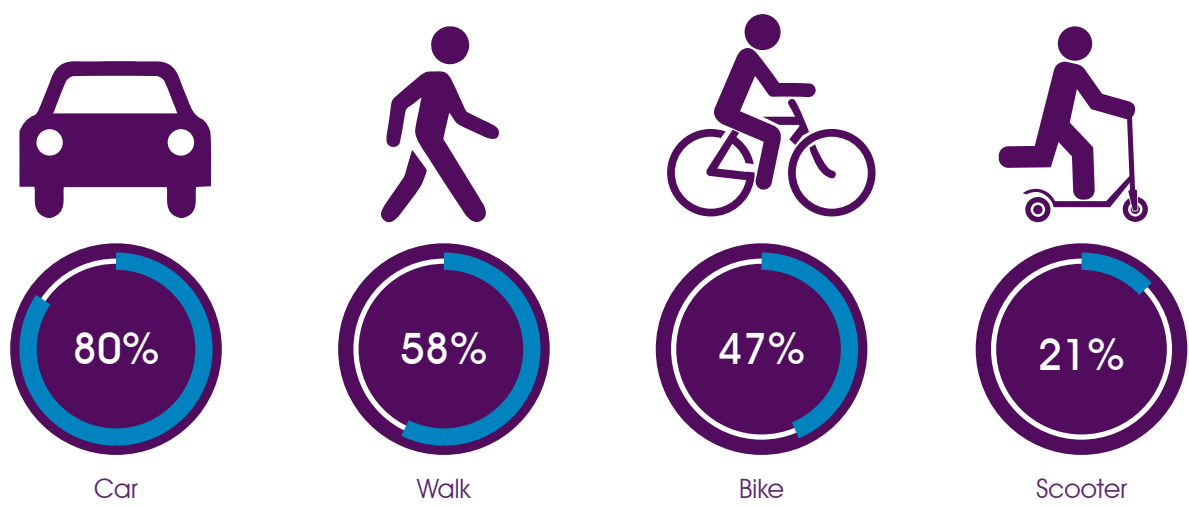

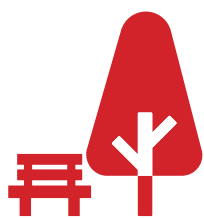

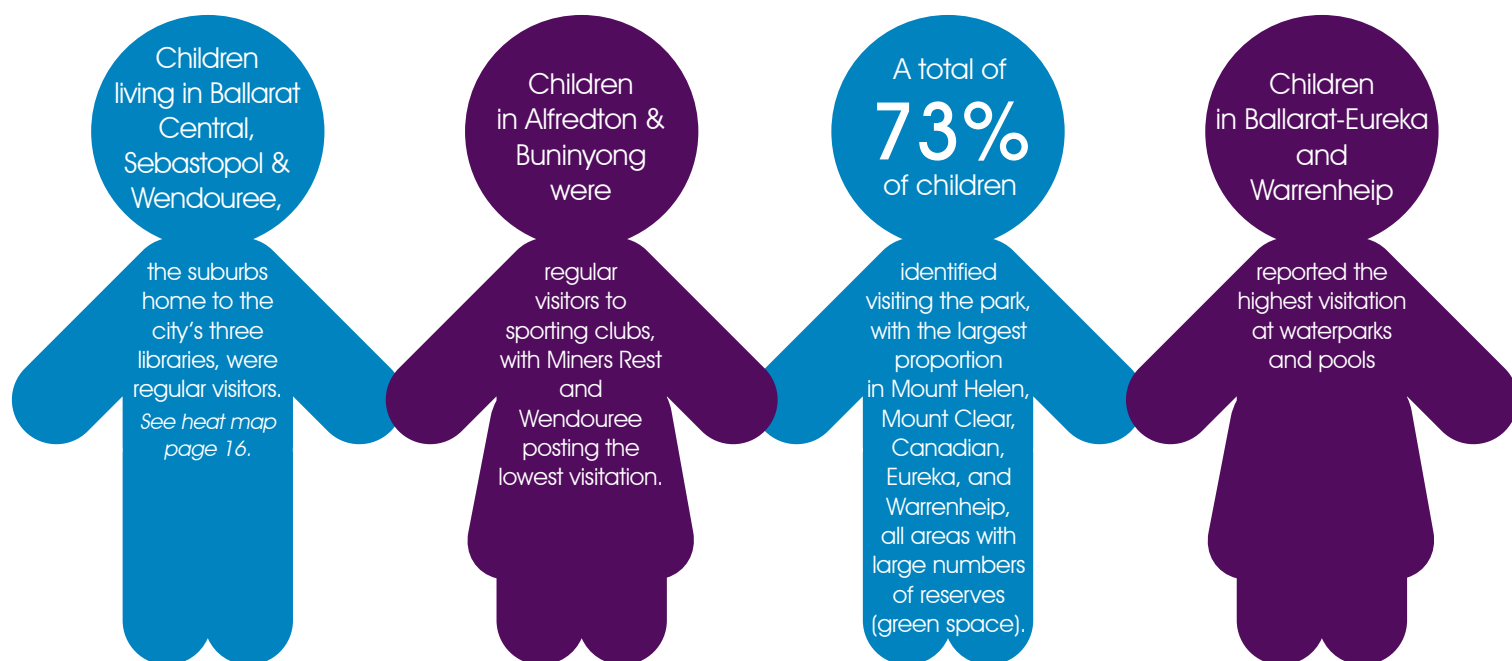

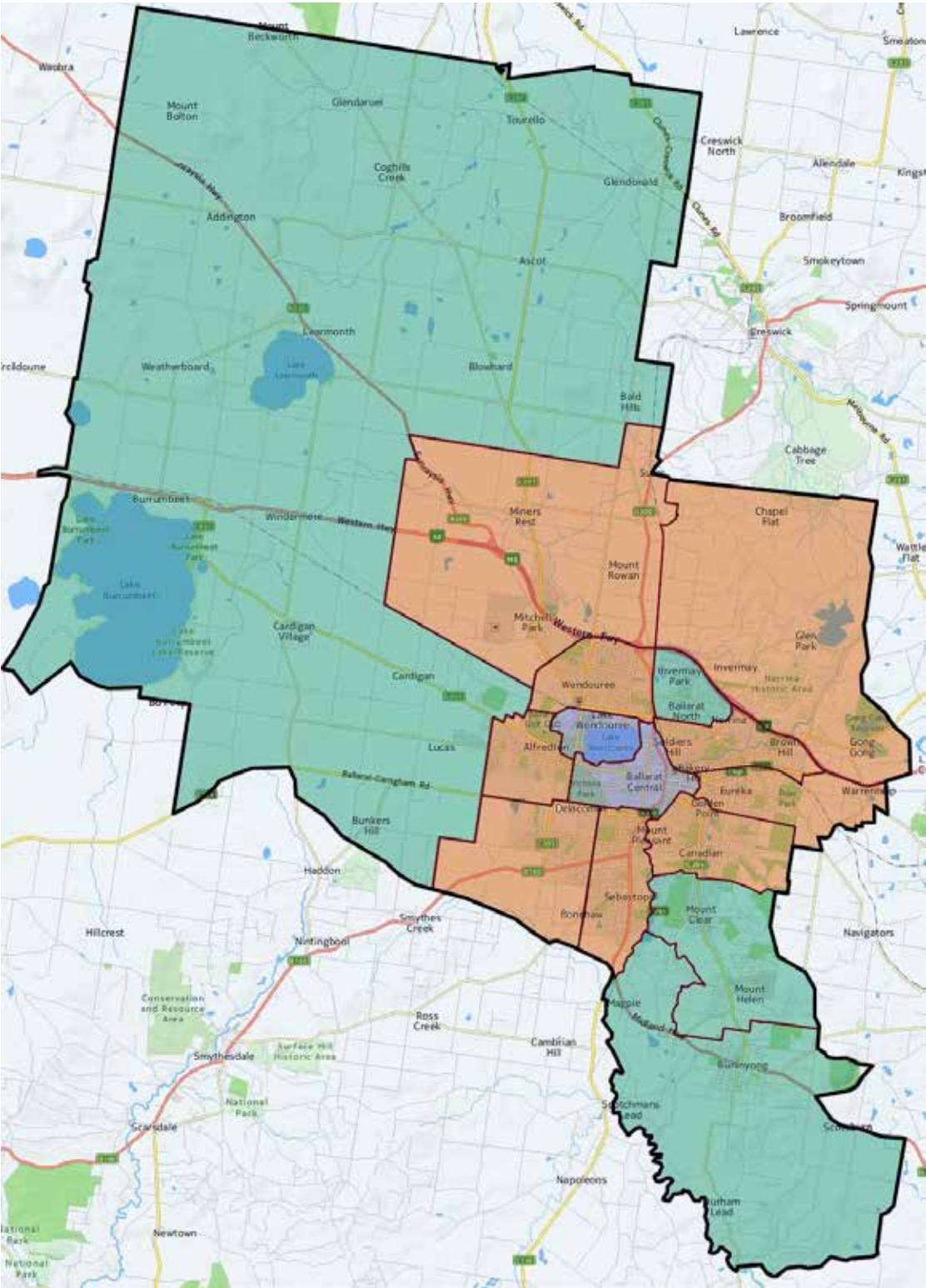

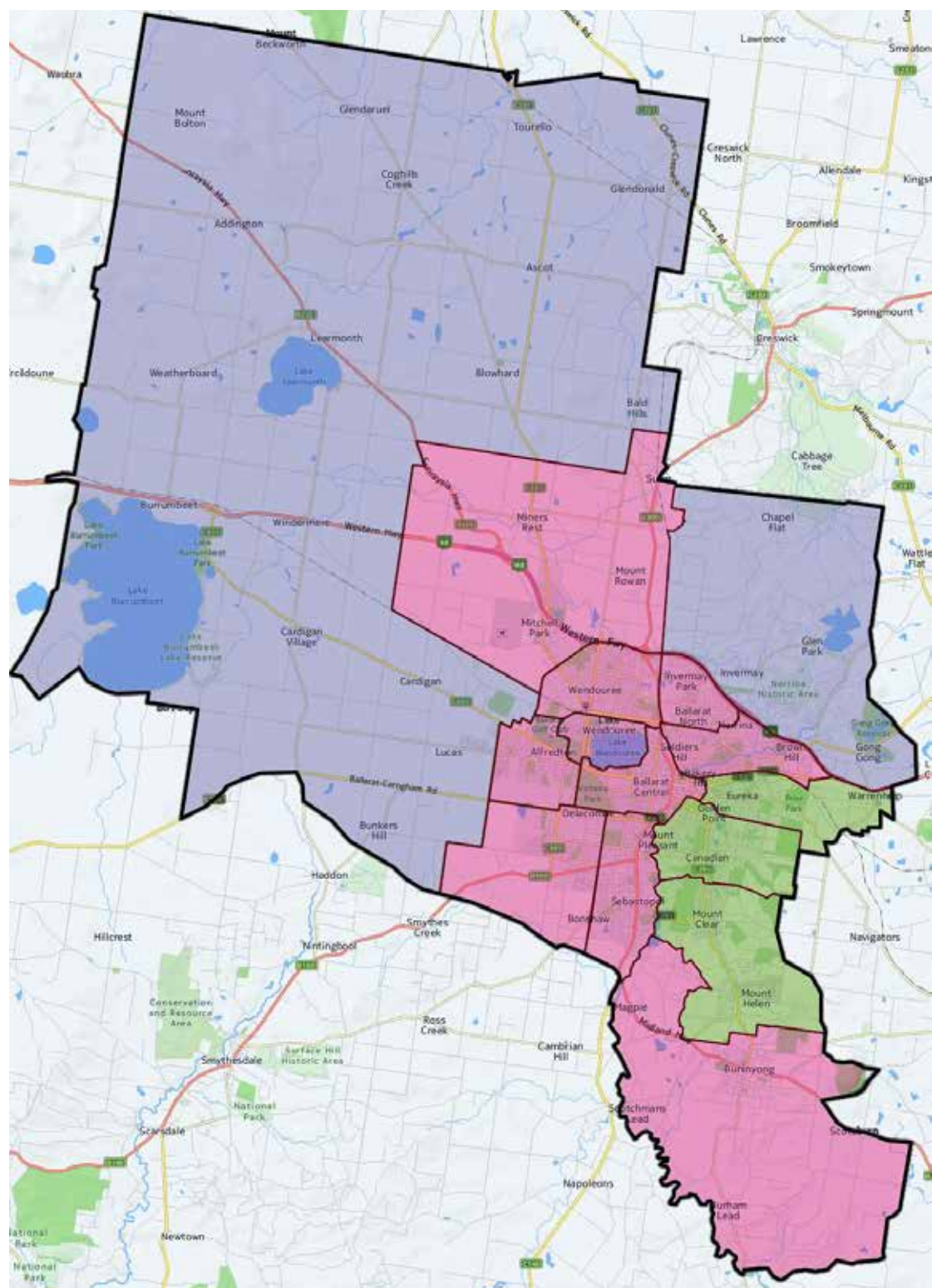

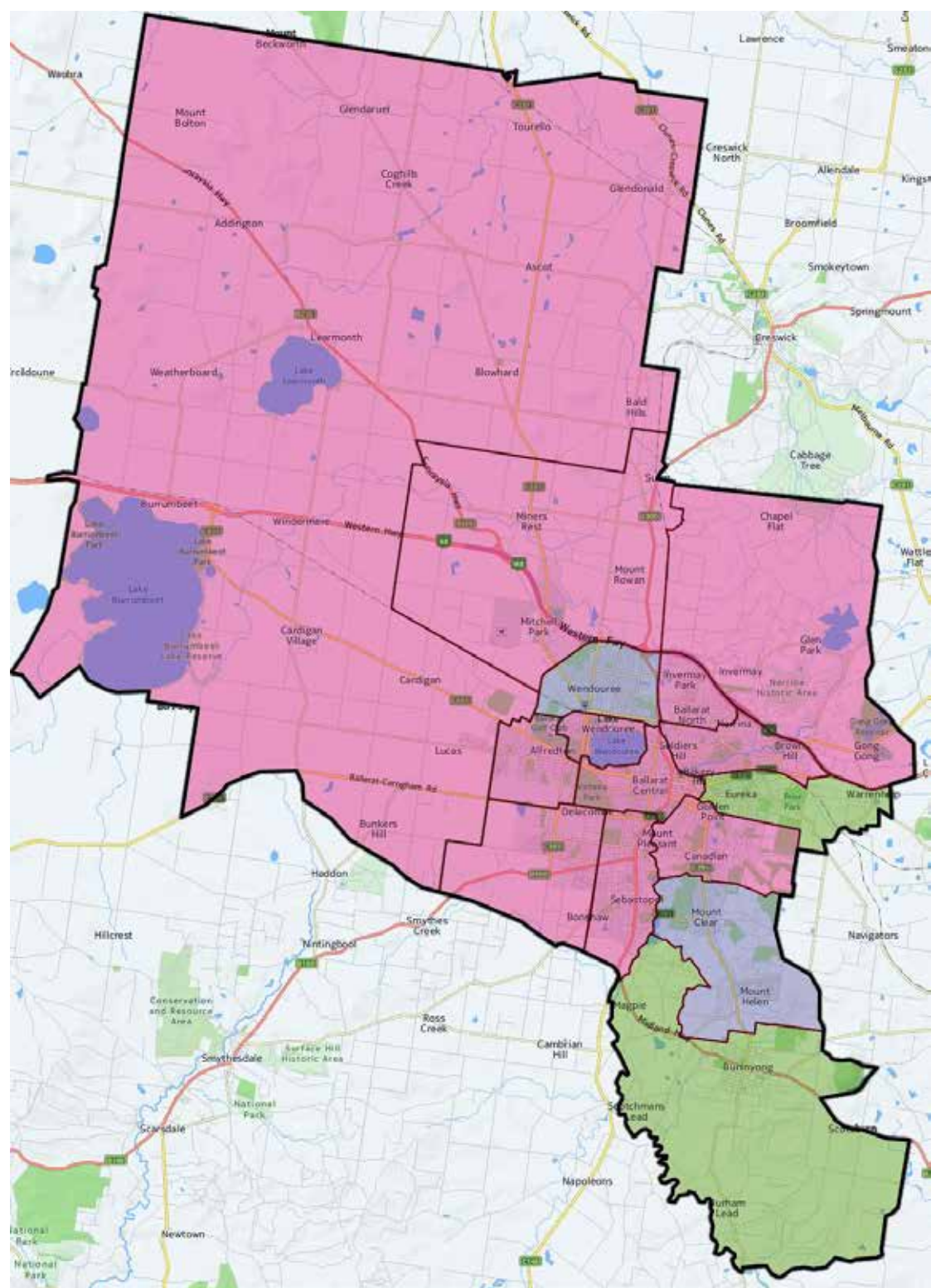

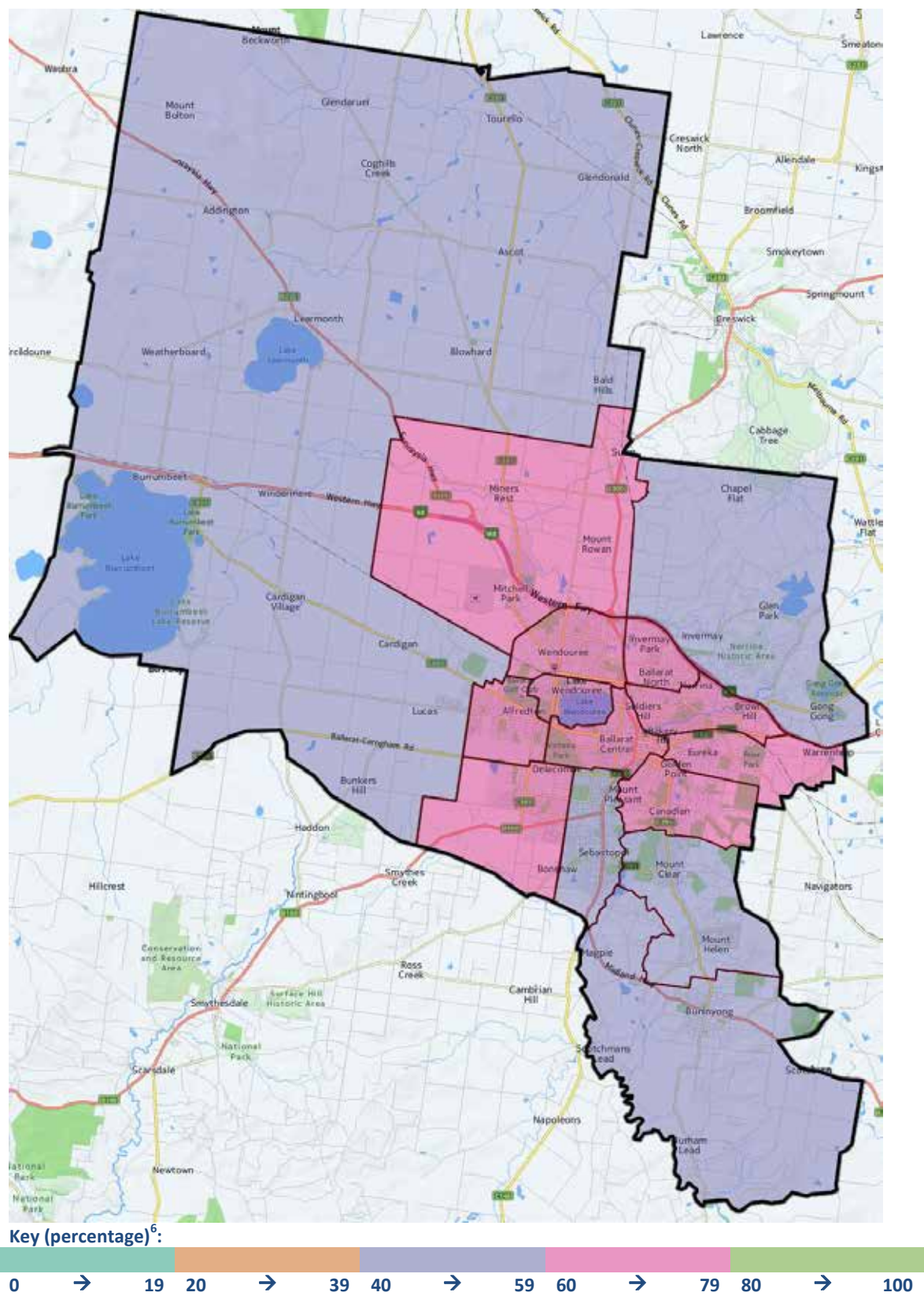

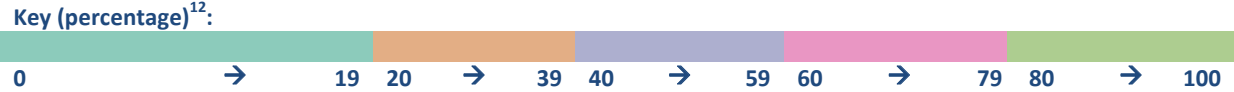
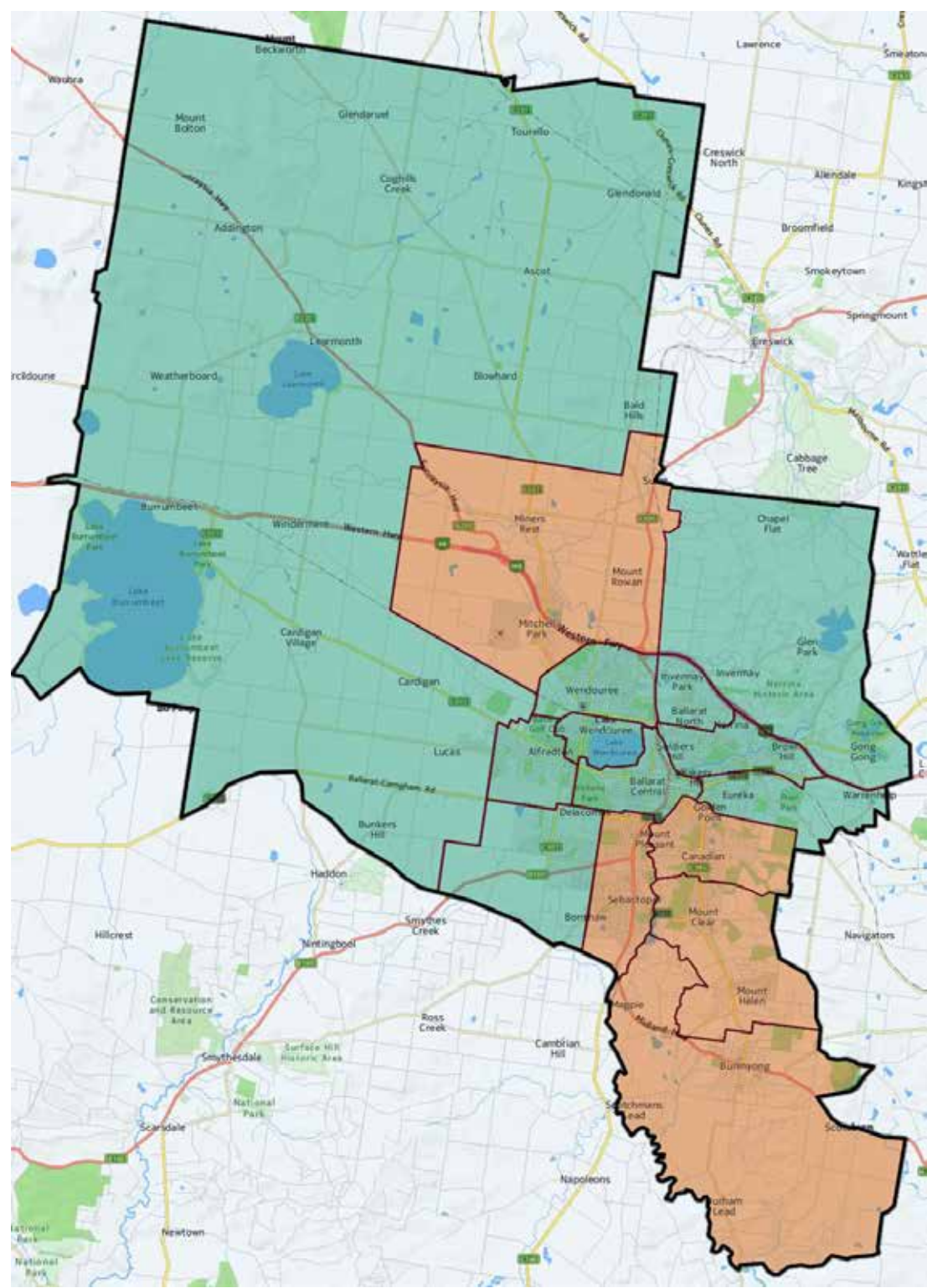

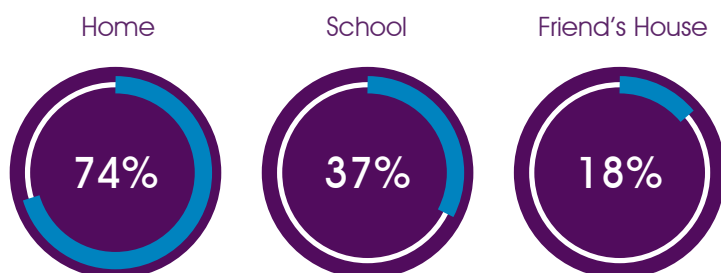

DELACOMBE

- * Put a crossing from Wiltshire Lane over to Kensington Estate.
- * Have people go slower in the court I live in

- * Police station
- * Infrastructure – library, stadium, carparks, shopping

MT CLEAR/MT HELEN

- * Make Uni students be sensible at night
- * Put things up that protect me from fires.

SEBASTOPOL

- * Have a party/meeting to get everyone to know each other better

BALLARAT EAST

- * Lock doors

WENDOUREE

- * Pets – doggy bag posts, pets in at night
- * Drugs
- * Ban Smoking

SOLDIERS HILL

- * Free wi-fi

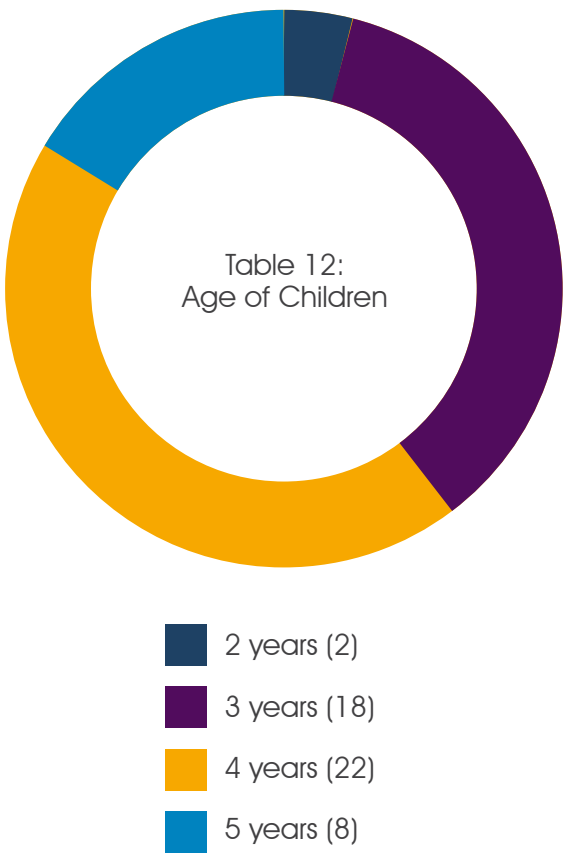

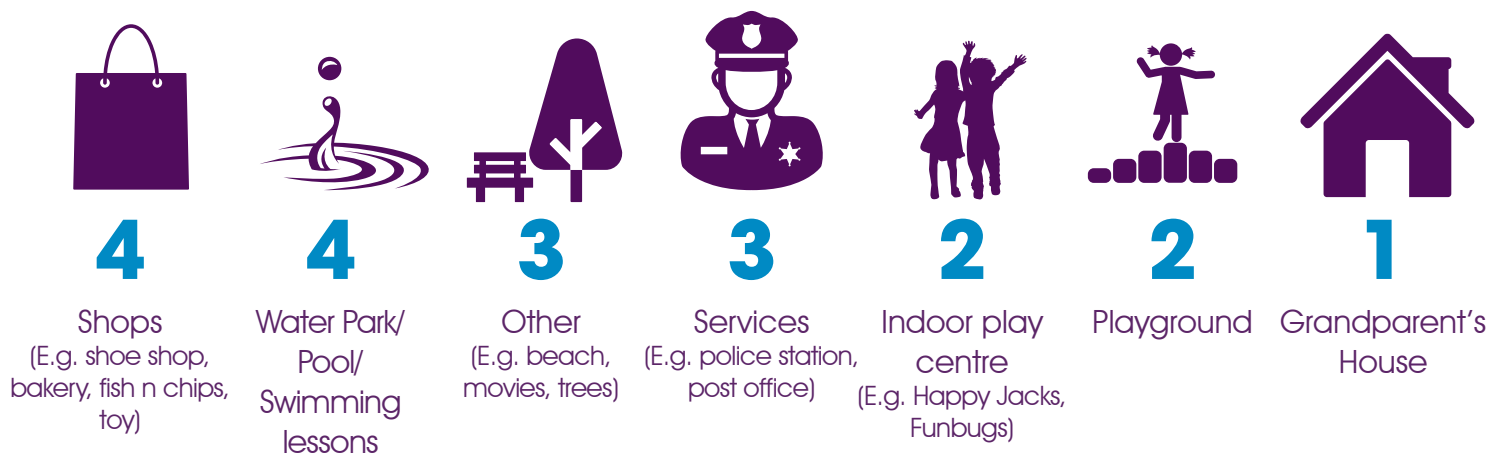
